FBSA Annual Conference 2018 -Shaping the future of Europe post-Brexit

The Franco-British Student Alliance (FBSA) Annual Conference brought 150 students from the United Kingdom and France to reflect on how students can work together to promote a close relationship amongst younger generations in the context of Brexit.

The two-day student conference involved workshops with experts in the fields of education, law and rights, innovation, community, science and cooperation; a pitch project competition with a 'Les Voisins Pitch Prize' awarded to the best project, to seed implementation, by H.E. Lord Ed Llewelyn (UK Ambassador to France) at the Ambassador's Residence; a start-up masterclass provided by three start-ups (Estimeo, Scientia Education and Wavely) at the French Ministry of Finance; a visit to the French National Assembly; a debate coaching at the Sorbonne provided by Débattre en Sorbonne and a parliamentary style debate.

Franco-British Young Leaders Programme

Incubated by the Franco-British Connections, the Franco-British Young Leaders programme aims to deepen understanding and collaboration between France and the UK at the highest level through the involvement of its most talented young leaders. **Its objective is to build a generation of 21st century leaders who will keep the Franco-British relations at heart, with a back/give forward ethos at its core.**

Alongside the Young Leaders community, the Franco-British Council piloted an initiative dedicated to supporting the social mobility for young people "Local Leaders" coming from disadvantaged backgrounds in both countries. 57 Young Leaders (25 from the promotion 2018 and 32 from the promotion 2017) and 21 Local Leaders (8 from the promotion 2018 and 13 from the promotion 2017) are now part of the community.

Franco Débats UK

Franco-British Connections founded the Inter-University Francophone Parliamentary Debate Tournament in the United Kingdom in 2012, with the involvement of 5 London universities: UCL, QMUL, LSE, King's and Imperial. Since this year, the baton has been passed to the Franco Débats UK association, which is now the body responsible for the organization of these tournaments. FDUK works under the auspices of Franco-British Connections as well as the Institut Français, and in partnership with the French Societies of UK universities.


The 'Débats Francophones' project is inspired from the British Parliamentart debate model and aims on initiating British and international students on this type of debates and public speaking in French.

The 2017-2018 tournament final event was organized in partnership with the French Embassy in London at the Institut Français in London. The teams of the universities of Exeter and Warwick had a debate on fake news media and government regulation.
